Activity 1: Tongue Twisters

Activity 3: Rhyming Relay

The class will be divided into two teams. Each team will establish an order of players (i.e. who goes first, second, third, etc.) Each team will be given a word on the board and when the clock starts, each team member will then have to write a word that rhymes underneath it, passing the marker to the next team member in line until the timer is up.



Write as many rhyming words as your team is able to (one word per person at a time) in 2 minutes for the first round!

The team with the most words that actually rhyme gets a point. The second round is 1 and a half minutes, then 1 minute, then 30 seconds!

The team with the most points at the end of all 4 rounds wins!

Activity 4: Wall Dictation

With a partner, dictate as much of this extract of this tricky poem as you can onto paper in 3 minutes - NO FRENCH!

If any French is used, you and your partner are out!

The team to complete the most of the poem with the least mistakes wins.

Below you will find the poem. Don't let your partner see it...!

Activity 5: Odd One Out Race

The teacher will write two or more words at a time on the board that have a similar vowel sound (ex: mitt, meat, meet - the odd one out is 'mitt').

The class will create two teams and then pair up with a member of the opposite team. Each pair will go to the back of the room, looking at the board.

When the teacher calls out a pair of words with similar sounds, the students will race to the front to touch the odd word out on the board.

Students from the winning team can have a turn at calling the words for others to run!
